## *Disaster Assistance Available for Agricultural-Dependent Small Businesses*

**Sacramento, CA** – Small, non-farm businesses in 28 Arkansas counties (plus neighboring counties in Missouri, Oklahoma and Tennessee) are eligible to apply for low-interest disaster loans from the U. S. Small Business Administration (SBA). These loans offset economic losses because of reduced revenues caused by severe ice storms and a freeze that occurred from January 26, 2009 through February 2, 2009, announced Alfred E. Judd, Director of SBA’s Disaster Field Operations Center - West.

Primary **Arkansas** Counties: Boone, Carroll, Clay, Craighead, Independence, IZard, Jackson, Mississippi and Washington

Neighboring **Arkansas** Counties: Baxter, Benton, Cleburne, Crawford, Crittenden, Cross, Fulton, Greene, Lawrence, Madison, Marion, Newton, Poinsett, Randolph, Searcy, Sharp, Stone, White and Woodruff

Neighboring **Missouri** Counties: Barry, Butler, Dunklin, Pemiscot, Ripley, Stone and Taney

Neighboring **Oklahoma** County: Adair

Neighboring **Tennessee** Counties: Dyer, Lauderdale and Tipton

Small businesses may qualify for Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) of up to \$2 million to help meet financial obligations and operating expenses which could have been met had the disaster not occurred. “Eligibility for these working capital loans is based on the financial impact of the disaster only and not on any actual property damage. These loans have an interest rate of 4%, a maximum term of 30 years, and are restricted to small businesses without the financial ability to offset the adverse impact without hardship,” Judd said.

By law, SBA makes EIDLs available when the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture designates an agricultural disaster. Secretary Tom Vilsack declared this disaster at the request of Governor Mike Beebe.

Businesses primarily engaged in farming or ranching are not eligible for SBA disaster assistance. Agricultural enterprises should contact the Farm Services Agency (FSA) about the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) assistance made available by the Secretary’s declaration. However, in drought disasters nurseries are eligible for SBA disaster assistance.
